

## **Fray Angelico Chavez History Library Amigos Fellowship Final Report**

### **Introduction**

The recipient, Patricia Hewitt, cataloger at the Fray Angelico Chavez History Library in Santa Fe, sought an Amigos Fellowship in 2010 to assist the Library in making its historic map collection accessible on WorldCat and in Contentdm. The Amigos Fellowship award of \$1861 funded travel and attendance at the ALA-Preconference entitled “Cataloging & Description of Cartographic Resources: from Parchment to Pixels, Paper to Digital” on June 24-25, 2010 in Washington, D.C. This map cataloging workshop assisted the recipient in learning more about map cataloging rules, policies and procedures. The ALA preconference covered map cataloging basics of bibliographic description of paper sheet maps on the first day, and expanded upon the basics to cover the cataloging of digital map collections on day two.

At the two-day workshop the recipient learned many new skills needed to create high-quality bibliographic records for sheet maps. The workshop covered these descriptive cataloging topics: how to decide which title to choose when more than one title appears on the map itself; the proper way to measure maps; how to record those measurements and other physical descriptions such as scales; how to correctly determine the scale on a map; what are the upcoming cataloging changes for maps under RDA.

Additionally, the workshop covered the topics of handling map series and the cataloging of facsimiles. Subject analysis and classification, as well as proper shelving and handling of maps were also covered in this workshop. Overall this two-day workshop gave the recipient the foundation needed to undertake the challenges presented to begin an inventory, analysis, and finally the cataloging of our large map collection.

In December of 2011 the Library received a grant from the Council on Library and Information Resources’ Cataloging Hidden Collections program in the amount of \$179,600. This grant has enabled the Library to hire additional staff to catalog its historic collection of approximately 5,000 maps on the Southwest. The training that the Amigos Fellowship afforded the recipient enabled her to better understand the challenges and parameters needed to establish the workflow necessary to manage a large map cataloging project. The map cataloging training provided with the Amigos Fellowship grant allowed the recipient to share the knowledge and skills she acquired at the two-day “Cataloging & Description of Cartographic Resources: from Parchment to Pixels, Paper to Digital” to train the grant staff hired to catalog our map collection.

### **Results**

The recipient, along with CLIR grant staff and volunteers, performed the following tasks by the end of the two year Fellowship award:

- Conducted a survey, with the assistance of a Library volunteer, to identify and prioritize the cataloging of the History Library's map collection and to assess conservation needs of the collection. In order to conduct the survey, the recipient and a Library volunteer pulled each folder in the map room, and examined each map in the folder. A form was created to record any conservation needs, called the Map Damage Report. The survey looked for these specific criteria for the individual maps:

- 1.) significant historic value
- 2.) Santa Fe
- 3.) New Mexico
- 4.) Southwest
- 5.) Railroads
- 6.) Mexico
- 7.) United States
- 8.) Other maps

The survey was begun in June 2010 and completed by January 2011. A copy of the completed map survey, and a blank copy of the Map Damage Report form are attached to the end of this report.

- Attended ALA pre-conference "Cataloging & Description of Cartographic Resources" on June 24-15-2010.
- Created cataloging records on WorldCat (along with CLIR funded staff) for 848 maps identified in the survey by end of the Fellowship period (June 2012). The original goal for the Fellowship period was 200 maps, but with the addition of CLIR funded staff we were able to accomplish more cataloging. As of the end of September 2013 the Library staff has cataloged over 3800 sheet maps.
- Digitized 29 maps and made them available on Contentdm by end of project (June 2012); our original goal was 25 maps.

## **Evaluation**

The following statistics were collected during the Fellowship period:

- Number of maps cataloged on WorldCat during the Fellowship period was 848. Approximately 60% of these records required original cataloging.
- 92 maps digitized as of September 2013
- 29 maps added to Contentdm so far
- (<http://econtent.unm.edu/cdm/landingpage/collection/histmaps>)
- Number of requests for maps (in-person and via telephone and email). The History Library has closed stacks, and all material usage, including maps, are requested from staff. We had just over 100 requests for maps during the Fellowship period. Most requests require that we retrieve several folders of maps, and each folder has several maps inside. The subject areas most frequently requested are the Santa Fe Trail, Santa Fe maps (King's map of 1912, and Sandborn insurance maps), and topographic maps of New Mexico. We also receive frequent request for maps which show land grants, and also requests for our Railroad maps. The cataloging of the Railroad maps is not quite finished, so we expect to have more requests as these records are imported into our local online catalog.
- Number of requests for duplication of maps—we had approximately 30 requests for map duplication during the Fellowship period. Many of the requests were for more than one map. Since the Library does not have a large scanner we have to take these materials to a commercial vendor and wait for the maps to be scanned. We can also have a Museum staff person take a digital photograph of the map(s).

## **Conclusion**

An analysis of map usage during Map Cataloging Project two year Fellowship time period shows that the number of requests for maps and the number of duplication requests has increased since we have been adding cataloging records for maps into our online catalog. Additionally, the Library staff feel that they have a better understanding of the scope of our map collection, and can offer more complete reference services as a result of having the maps cataloged in the online catalog. The recipient is confident that the skills acquired with the assistance of the Fellowship will continue to help her sustain and build her cataloging skills to provide better access to the Library's collections through the online catalog, and our other online discovery tools such as Contentdm and Encoded Archival Descriptions on the Rocky Mountain Online Archive.

The Amigos Fellowship grant awarded to the recipient allowed for both personal growth and professional development of cataloging skills, specifically related to map cataloging. The Fellowship also resulted in the recipient being able to train additional staff in map cataloging, and in having both the tools and knowledge to undertake a large map cataloging project. The Fray Angelico Chavez History Library has benefited greatly from having its senior cataloger be the recipient of the Amigos Fellowship, and also from the recipient writing, acquiring, and managing the CLIR Cataloging Hidden Collections grant. The Amigos Fellowship provided the funding for training which was crucial to the awarding and the success of the CLIR grant. Our Library has a wonderful collection of New Mexico and Southwest history, but it is a small institution, with only two full time staff. Grants and Fellowships allow our staff the training and support needed to provide our users with better access to our collections.
